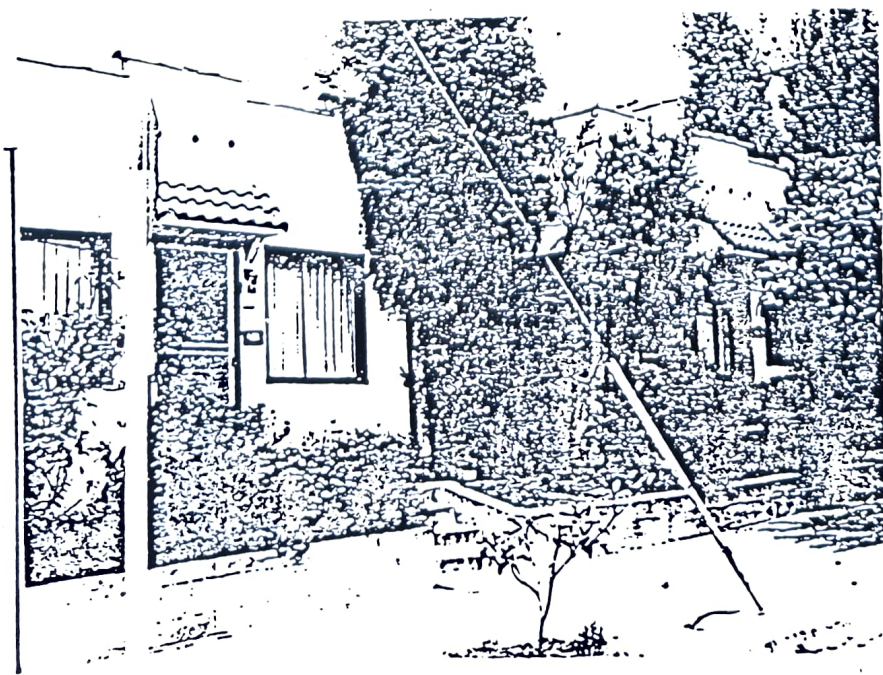

DESCRIPTION

- 7a. Architectural style: Spanish Colonial Court
- 7b. Briefly describe the present physical description of the site or structure and describe any major alterations from its original condition:
The 8-unit beach cottages at 104 N. Broadway are built in a Spanish Colonial court style -- 6 one-story unit structures and 2 two-story structures which are located at the northeastern corner of Broadway and Emerald. The units are similar constructed. Each has a crenelated parapet roof bordered with red clay Spanish tiles. The walls are stuccoed. There is a variety of window types -- double hung casement and fixed with most windows divided into a cross tic-tac-toe pattern by mullions. Red tiled roofs cap the low arches which link the units to form the court. Small shed roofs covered with red tile shelter the entry door to each cottage. Round tiles set into the walls and over the doors provide ventilation. Garages are located beneath the two-story structures. A 2½-foot retaining wall encloses the lot. The garden needs to be landscaped which will take care of the overgrown shrubbery.

SIGNIFICANCE

19. Briefly state historical and/or architectural importance (include dates, events, and persons associated with the site.)

Built in 1925, the bungalow court is built in a Spanish Colonial style. One of only nine bungalow courts remaining in the City, these distinctive housing styles provided beach cottages at moderate prices for the influx of visitors and new residents to this seaside community.

Collectively, these cottages and other buildings recorded on this survey reflect the broad patterns of history that shaped this seaside resort which has become a diversified beach and harbor oriented community.

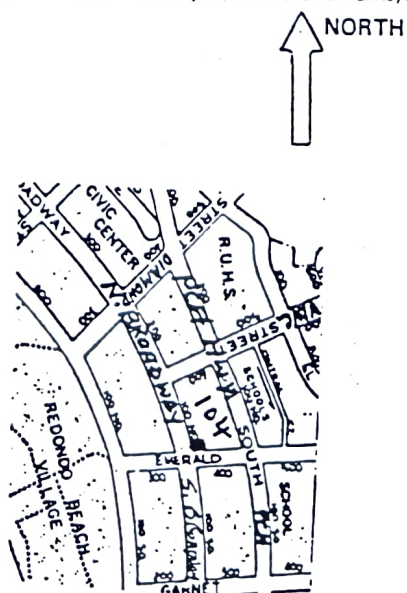

C. Potential Historic Districts

In addition to individual structures, collections of buildings are important from a historic preservation standpoint where these collections:

"represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction" (National Register Criteria, U.S. Government Printing Office 1983-418-331)

Such collections of buildings should maintain the feeling and association of the past and are generally termed an historic district. The State Office of Historic Preservation requires that to be eligible as an historic district, an area must have an internal coherence - and be relatively free of new developments or altered structures which change the appearance of the area in its historic period.

In Redondo Beach, eight geographic areas have been originally defined by the survey consultants as being "distinguishable entities" with the "internal coherence" to be considered as potential historic districts. Additionally one thematic district was identified. A thematic district is a group of structures or sites which are geographically separated, but which are linked by a common theme in terms of architectural style or historic use. These eight areas and the thematic district were examined by the Evaluation Committee. The seven areas the Committee recommended as potential districts are described below and are illustrated on Figure 15.

Two areas were defined as priority districts and have been included in the detailed survey work. These areas include structures which would be eligible for individual as well as district listing.

1. **400 block of Emerald Street (#411, 413, 415, 417):** These four transitional houses, built in the early 1910's, have elements of the Craftsman, Colonial Revival and Victorian styles. Long recognized as the premier group of historic structures in the City, any one of these structures would also be eligible for individual listing on the National Register.

2. **400 block of Miramar Drive (#413, 415, 417, 419):** These four houses were built in 1928 by the same owner and are based on a single Spanish Revival design. The view of the sea from this hilltop setting reflects the "miramar" name. Although more modest than the houses in Group #1, the consistency of design and the location of these houses provide a strong support for their listing as a district.

Five other larger areas are also considered potential historic districts. Collectively, these districts include some of the most significant structures (approximately) in the City and an additional 200 structures which are not individually notable but which contribute to the character of the district. These include:

3. 300 block of North Gertruda Avenue (#302-328, 303-329), 600 block of Carnelian Street (#609-611, 610-614): This area, comprising approximately 32 houses, constitutes the largest remaining single concentration of houses built during the early settlement period of the City (particularly the 1910's). Research indicates that this district housed both a judge and a doctor, who were prominent citizens in early Redondo history. Within this area #312, 323 and 326 were noted by the Evaluation Committee as non-contributing structures due to age or alterations.

4. Avenue A through Avenue F from PCH to Catalina): This large area originally known as Clifton-by-the-Sea was annexed to the City in 1913. The area includes approximately 150 houses, representing most of the major housing types built in the City from the 1910's to the early 1930's. The area retains its integrity, representing the type of neighborhood of small beach-oriented permanent homes that attracted residents to the expanding City in the 1920's. Further work will be needed to identify contributing and non-contributing structures.

5. 500 block of South Catalina Avenue (#514-528, 517-523): This partial block consisting of nine houses includes some of the larger Craftsman style houses built in the City in the 1920's. Number 522 is a non-contributing structure, according to the Evaluation Committee review.

6. 400 block of South Broadway (east side) (#400-428): This group of thirteen buildings is anchored by the Women's Club, which is listed on the National Register, and also includes Christ Church Episcopal, the earliest remaining church and only example of Gothic Revival architecture in the City. Three buildings (#416, 422, and 426) are non-contributing due to age or alterations.

7. 500 block of Garnet Street (#510-528, 501-523): This block includes ten houses, mostly Craftsman and Colonial Revival styles, built in the early 1910's and 1920's. Additional houses within the block may be non-contributing.

A thematic district incorporates common elements which may not be geographically concentrated. Following Pasadena's lead, Redondo may wish to consider all of the bungalow courts in the City as a thematic district. This unusual housing type was especially suited to a beach community where many visitors maintained summer homes. These tiny cottages, or bungalows, continue to serve a need today by providing low and moderate income housing, with more privacy and open space than is available in most apartments. Many of these courts are threatened by new development since they generally occupy lots zoned for higher densities, where condos would be permitted. Of the nine courts reviewed by the Evaluation Committee, three were determined to be too altered for inclusion in the district and two others need some restoration work. The remaining bungalow courts which should be considered for this district are found at the following addresses:

Charles Wortham, ex-mayor, dies at 94

Former Redondo Beach Mayor **Charles H. Wortham**, known at various times as "Mr. Democrat" and "Mr. Redondo," died Tuesday at South Bay Hospital.

He had been admitted to the hospital in poor health one week ago.

Wortham was born Nov. 27, 1884, in Mississippi and eventually moved to Texas, where he attended high school and college.

Settling in Redondo Beach in 1932, he spent more than four decades

building a reputation as an energetic participant in both civic and political affairs.

Despite failing eyesight in recent years, Wortham still attended many civic gatherings and often offered his advice to Redondo Beach officials on matters before the city.

A builder and apartment house operator, he was active in the Boy Scouts, the American Field Service, the March of Dimes, the South Bay Civic Symphony, and the Elks, Op-

timist, Eagles and Masonic lodges.

He was the oldest person ever to sit on the Los Angeles County grand jury, having been a member in 1965 at 81.

Wortham also was a member of the state Democratic Central Committee and a delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 1948 and 1952.

He became friends with Harry Truman in 1948 while riding on the presidential train from Oklahoma City to Los Angeles.

Wortham was known for his feisty nature and sometimes uncompromising style of politics.

He became involved in Redondo Beach politics with a group of other local residents determined to break up big time gambling interests that had established a foothold in the city.

He was a councilman from 1941 to 1947, when he was elected mayor. He was re-elected mayor in 1949 (a mayor served two-year terms at that time) but became the center of

a local political controversy within a year.

Wortham had spearheaded an unsuccessful recall drive against four councilmen. But when that effort failed, the four launched their own recall drive against Wortham.

He eventually resigned as mayor in 1950, three weeks before the recall election.

Despite the controversy he often stirred, Wortham was proud of his

accomplishments while on the City Council and of his record as a fighter.

"I tried to give the people what they wanted, what they needed and what they should have. If something was good for the city — no matter what — I'd fight for it.

"If it wasn't, look out, because I'd fight it," he once told a reporter.

His family members were equally fond of this trait. Margaret Moody, one of his three daughters, said Tuesday:

"We had a family joke that those of his political cronies he couldn't convince, he just outlived them."

Mrs. Moody said her father remained a prominent fixture in local civic activities virtually until his death.

"He just didn't live in the past," Mrs. Moody said. "It was always the future for him."

Area officials were sorry to hear of Wortham's death.

"I'd known Charley for many years, and I'm saddened at his death," said State Sen. Robert Beverly, R-27th Dist. "Although he had been active in the other party, we had been friends and I valued his friendship.

"I really believe that politics and government in California enjoys a national reputation for honesty, for being free of bossism. And that's in large part because you have the active participation of men like Charley Wortham."

Wortham is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Moody of Redondo Beach, Elizabeth Seals of Anaheim and Virginia Costanzo of Tarzana; a sister, Fani Lucas of Elsinore; 10 grandchildren, and 21 great-grandchildren.

Visitation will be held from 5 to 9 p.m. Friday at the White and Day Mortuary chapel, Redondo Beach. Services will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday at the Redondo Beach Elks Lodge 1378.

Burial will follow at Pacific Crest Cemetery in Redondo Beach.

Lifeguard Exam Begin Saturday

The first in a series of qualifying examinations for summer season pool guards, pool managers and beach guards will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday at Los Angeles Swim Stadium, 3966 Menlo Ave.

Men and women over 18 years of age who possess valid senior lifesaving certificates may apply for the swim tests, said Michael C. Cronin, supervisor of aquatics for the Department. The aquatics test consists of a 200-yard medley and a 70-foot dummy-tow.

Women who apply as pool and beach guards must be 5 feet 4 and

weigh 120 pounds. Men 5 feet 7 and weigh 145 qualify.

Jobs as pool managers only to men over 21 years who are 5 feet 6, weigh more and are in good condition.

Dates for the remaining exams are: Saturdays, a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Apr. 27 and 1 to 4 p.m. May 4.

Applications for posts and beach guards and managers may be obtained at City Hall or Van Ness Hall.

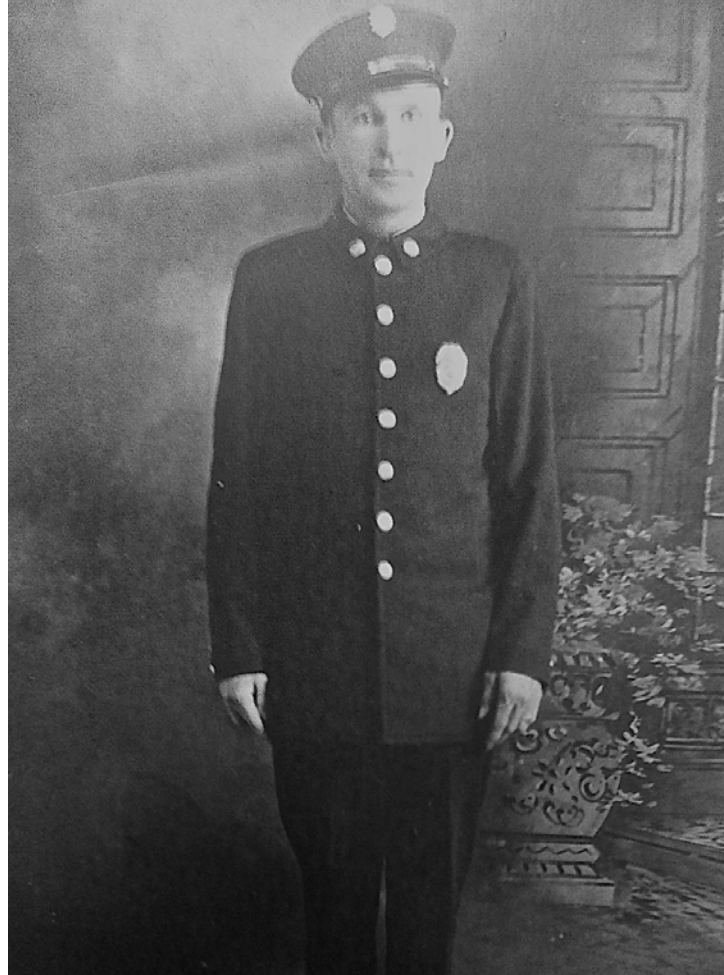

Fireman recalls colorful past

Floyd Ingram still plays a pretty good game of golf. He also travels a great deal. Last year he visited Hawaii, Canada, Mt. Rushmore and the Grand Canyon.

Floyd Ingram is 78. With more than 30 years of public service behind him, Ingram now has time to travel. He also has time to remember the way it was as the first paid fire captain for both El Segundo and Redondo Beach.

"In those days," Ingram says, "a lot of firemen lost their lives because they didn't have the knowledge or equipment that exists today to deal with some of the more hazardous fires."

"To be a fireman then, you were either a fool or you had a lot guts," he says.

Ingram began his career in 1924, when he joined the Redondo Beach Fire Department as its first paid engineer. He later became captain.

He tired of fighting fires in 1934 and became a deputy sheriff in what is now El Porto, an unincorporated area near Manhattan Beach. Then in 1937, he moved to the El Segundo Police Department as a patrolman.

He next joined that city's fire department in 1940, and remained there until his retirement in 1966.

Born in South Dakota in 1890, Ingram arrived in the South Bay stop a Model-T in 1923. After six years as a fireman, he settled in El Segundo where he resides today.

"In all my years of fighting fires, one episode stands out above all the rest," Ingram said.

"We responded to a call and found 17 gasoline storage tanks on fire in Inglewood. Several of them blew up from the intense heat."

"We finally put it out with water and foam, but not before we spent an entire night on top of a single protective fire wall for all 17 tanks," he said.

"The heat was so intense that we would have to lie on the ground and turn out steel helmets around to protect us while we directed hoses on the fire."

"I remember some Salvation Army gals who came to the fire all night — right up to the fire wall — bringing us coffee and sandwiches. I told them it was dangerous up there but they wouldn't listen to me. They just looked at me and said, 'You're up here, aren't you?'"

Parenting classes

Earlier in his career, Ingram was seriously injured combatting a Redondo Beach fire. Slipping in a heavy rain storm, he suffered a skull fracture. Ingram claims the fire resulted when a bootlegger accidentally set his house afire.

Yet, all of his memories are not unpleasant, nor are they filled with the normal hazards of a fireman's career.

Ingram recalls a money-raising contest held in Redondo Beach. "It was just a race between a bunch of toads," he said.

Ingram said his men complained that all the toads on hand for the event were far too lazy to win any races, so he and his men travelled more than 20 miles to find their own toad.

They quickly christened their entry "Smoke Eater," and with equal promptness, Smoke Eater won \$50 for the department.

How does Ingram feel about today's highly-evolved science of fire fighting?

"The equipment is far superior to anything we ever dreamed of having, it's highly advanced. I think today's firemen are a fine group of men — especially the paramedics — who can give so much more service to the people of the community than we could," Ingram said.

"But after all these years," he adds, "when I read about entire families still being burned to death somewhere, I'll tell you, my heart still bleeds."

"About the only thing that hasn't changed after all these years, I think is that people still don't have enough respect for fire and what it can do."

With tearful eyes and a suddenly somber voice, Ingram speaks of his wife, Vair Zona, who died five years ago.

"She had a beautiful Indian name," he says. "She was a lovely, marvelous woman and her character was beyond reproach. She was a wonderful influence on me."

"You know, women are funny. They'll either make a man or do him in," Ingram said. "I'm not a deeply religious man. I even used to wonder how to pray. Now, since my wife died, I've learned how to pray a little."

At age 78, Ingram scoffs at any thought of slowing down. What's next?

"Well, I've been thinking a lot about Tahiti lately."

First of all, we must realize that they are under constant strain, being famous and usually wealthy, they are eternally sought after for favors, appearances, autographs, loans, even smiles or looks of recognition.

The result is that only a few, such as Van Johnson and Bob Hope, appear to enjoy being out in public. The vast majority try to avoid being recognized and venture outside film colony haunts only when necessary for business reasons. The extreme, of course, was Greta Garbo, who could not bear the glare of other eyes even inside a studio. There are many others with less advanced stages of Garbo-itis.

Can't Remember Names

Movie stars are notably bad at remembering names. The reason is because they meet 100 times more people than the average citizen and would have to be mental giants to remember everyone. I never strain an actor's memory for my name,

even when I have met them many times.

The usual routine of a person meeting a star is: "We met at a premiere in Peoria in 1937—don't you remember?" The star will always say, "Oh, yes, of course I remember," but it's 10 to 1 he doesn't.

Most stars have a phobia against telephones. They are pestered over the wires as much as they are in person. For that reason, they change their phone numbers with the seasons. Many won't come to the phone, instructing their flunkies to take the number of the person calling and promise a return call.

"Who's Calling?"

On rare occasions when a star answers the phone, he always asks "Who's calling?" before revealing his identity.

The retiring nature of stars in public would not be as profound except for a certain type of people who follow them about. These are the scatter-brained kids, the professional celebrity hunters and the minor hoodlums whose greatest pleasure in life is to bedevil the famed.

Perhaps we should have a "be kind to movie stars week." Though it is sometimes hard to believe, they are also human.

Strand Residents Get Respite From Raging Surf

**Property Losses Will Run
Into Thousands;
Expedite Repairs**

After a full week of releasing all of its fury on the Redondo Beach Strand, the Pacific Ocean suddenly "calmed down" this morning giving residents of the stricken area their first breathing spell since Wednesday afternoon, last week.

Waves today were barely splashing water over the rock wall and none could be called forceful . . .

this contrasted to yesterday's scene of giant waves sweeping over a bulldozer and soaking many onlookers.

Some Strand residents have indicated that they will not attempt to repair the damage to their homes again until the storm season is over. Perhaps some say, they will leave their homes boarded up until something is determined for the permanent solution to the seawall problem. The completion of the Redondo Harbor project, they agreed, was the only answer.

Damage to residences, the loss of personal property, cost of labor and the damage to the Strand walk and seawall will run into several hundred thousands of dollars according to unofficial estimates.

Hurry Repairs

The R. H. Wicking Co. hurried their repairs to the wall along in order to put the wall in a seaworthy condition.

This morning several hundred persons lined the damage area in order to get a glimpse of the huge waves, but the ocean failed to put on the spectacular show it has previously.

City forces moved in to clean out streets and clear the area of rubble.

INTRUDER IN LOCAL HOMES GOES TO JAIL

Bedrooms

O. L. Francis, 403 Emerald street, a dweller in the peaceful city of Redondo Beach for only a few days, last night, or early this morning, became thoroughly acquainted with several of our citizens, including the police department, who pursued him thither and you, and in and out for the better part of an hour.

The story is this: At 1:43 a. m. today John Carson, 138-B South Broadway, was alarmed when he was awakened by someone trying to get into his bed. The bold prowler, upon being questioned by Mr. Carson, said that his car had broken down and he wanted some help in fixing it.

Just about that time Constable John Henry drove into the driveway on his way home, which was one of the group of houses near Carson's. The prowler left hastily without even a farewell.

The second installment of the tale was written at 2:05 a. m. today, when O. G. Myers, of 1st Sunset court, Redondo, reported to the police that a prowler had entered his bedroom through an open window, and when Myers had awakened, had fled by diving through a window that was not open, scattering glass to the four winds.

At 2:30 a. m. the third and last episode was registered when Claude Taylor, of 201 South Elena, Redondo, told how a prowler had removed a screen from a window of his house and entered. When Taylor saw him he ran, falling into a fish pond.

By this time the police force was on the trail of the prowler, who evidently had hidden himself somewhere between Garnet and Opal on Broadway. Then he was seen walking west on Opal toward Catalina street. Sergeant Smith, of the Redondo police force, spotted the man as he was making his way north on Catalina street.

Clothes Closet Fire, Redondo
