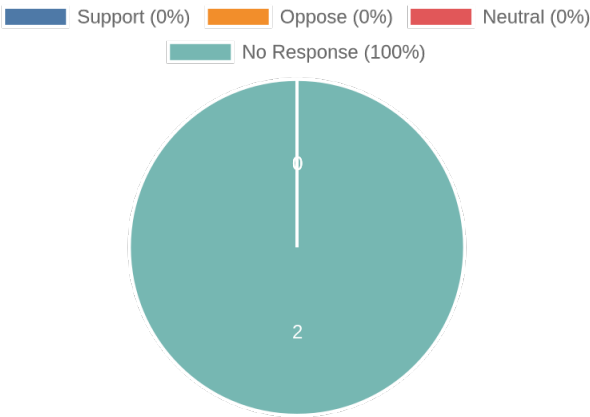

Overall Sentiment



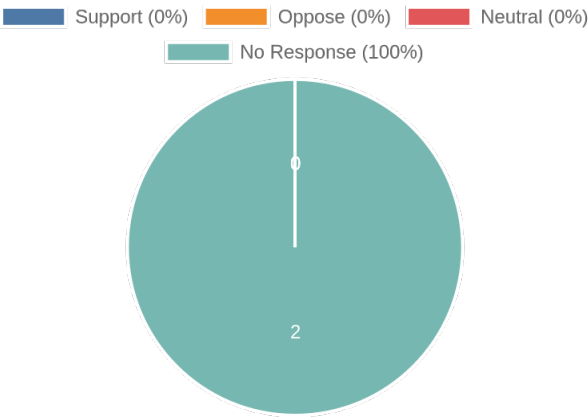

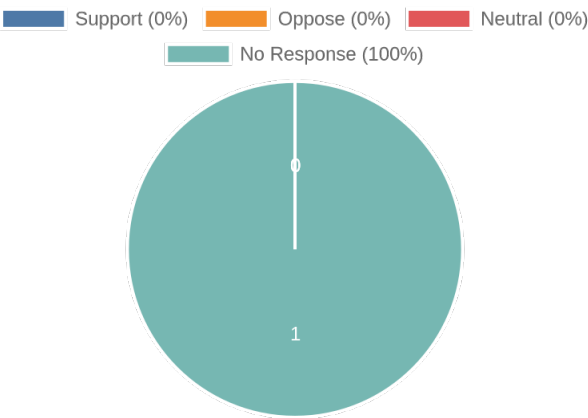

Overall Sentiment

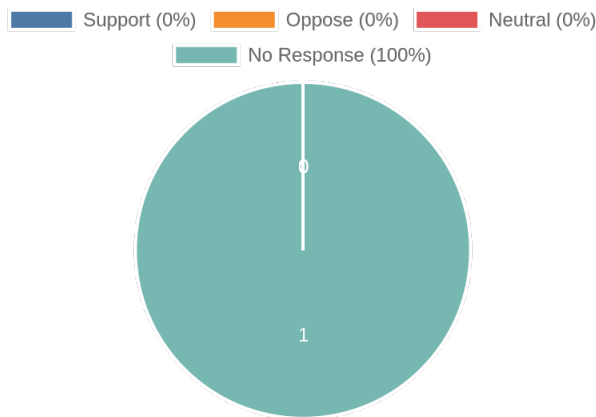

Good evening, Chair and Commissioners.

My name is Bryan Stone and I am a Redondo Beach resident.

I am here regarding the automated license plate reader cameras that were recently expanded in the Harbor and Pier area, as well as the broader issue of continuous surveillance systems operating in the waterfront.

These cameras continuously scan every vehicle that passes. Similar systems in other Southern California cities, including Los Angeles and South Pasadena, have faced serious problems with data ownership, unauthorized access by outside agencies, and privacy concerns. Several cities have since suspended or ended their contracts.

I am not asking this Commission to shut down legitimate public-safety tools. I am asking you to support clear local rules that:

- Phase out continuous fixed ALPR networks that scan the general public without suspicion
- Prohibit facial recognition and AI analysis of people's movement patterns unless a person is already identified as a person of interest in a specific investigation
- Require judicial warrants as the default for any remaining use
- Increase transparency through public camera maps, audit logs, and independent review

The Harbor Commission has a direct interest because these systems operate in the area under your jurisdiction. I respectfully request that you place this topic on a future agenda for discussion and consider recommending to the City Council that stronger privacy and accountability rules be developed.
